AUSTRALIAN SHOTCRETE SOCIETY (AUSS)

AuSS organised the Shotcrete 2024 two-day workshop, held at the Novotel Preston in Victoria on the 14-15 August 2024. It was an outstanding success, with over 120 participants.

Day 1 of the workshop included the nuances of mix design for underground shotcrete, cutting-edge spraying techniques, and the fine details of surface finishes. The morning and afternoon tea breaks provided participants with ample opportunities to network, exchange ideas, and build professional connections. The day culminated in a lively predinner drinks session, fostering further collaboration and informal discussions that extended the learning experience beyond the formal sessions.

On Day 2, the focus shifted to the exploration of low-carbon concrete binders, the examination of recent shotcrete projects, and the insights of contractors on the practical challenges and solutions in shotcrete applications. The event concluded with a comprehensive general discussion on spraying and quality issues. Throughout the workshop, the skilful facilitation by session chairs and the use of roving microphones ensured that all voices were heard, making the event not only informative but also highly interactive and engaging.
